MORRY'S STORY

On October 31, 1994, the camping world lost a true hero.

For 30 years, Morry Stein was the owner and director of Camp Echo Lake in Warrensburg, New York, one of America's premier children's summer camps, and a national leader in the American Camping Association. Morry died in the crash of American Eagle Flight 4184 in Roselawn, Indiana.

Morry and his wife Amy rose to the forefront of their field by establishing Camp Echo Lake as one of the finest camps in the country. Morry acknowledged the long-term impact that camping made on the lives of the upper middle-class youngsters served by Camp Echo Lake. He very much wanted this experience to be shared with children from all socioeconomic groups. In 1970, Amy and Morry created and implemented the Camp Echo Lake Idea, a weeklong scholarship camping program for children from under-resourced communities.

For Morry, this program was just the beginning. His goal was to give no less than every American child, regardless of economic status, the invaluable gift of summer camp. Morry was the Chairperson of the American Camping Foundation, an organization that raised over \$1 million to send underprivileged children to summer camp. On October 28, 1994, he traveled to Martinsville, Indiana to head the Foundation's Annual Board Meeting. The meeting was charged with excitement as the organization was nearing its fundraising goal, and the gift that Morry felt was so needed was about to be given.

Morry's life was taken on his return flight home, before he could fulfill his mission. In 1995, inspired by his dream and to ensure that his vision of summer camp for all children became a reality, Morry's friends, colleagues, campers and family created Morry's Camp. In Fall 2007, the name Project Morry was adopted to communicate the full scope of our year-round youth development organization and reflect the comprehensive educational programming.

We stand in circles at our school year meetings, and we sit in a circle around our campfires. Project Morry is a circle with no real beginning or end, just a wonderful constant movement around a center. And who is at the center, the heart and soul of Project Morry?

The circle of commitment is the real life embodiment of our mission. We rely on the dedication and caring of the people who surround our children in their homes, schools, communities and at Morry's Camp. This circle is supported by our superb year-round and summer staff. And above all else, at the center of our circle, we celebrate the young people who participate in Project Morry...day in and day out. It is our joy to watch the boys and girls examine their motivations, build self-confidence, understand life's decisions and consequences, set their standards of achievement at personal excellence and reach for the stars. When one young person stands tall and feels proud in the center of our circle, it impacts us all.

Project Morry has evolved over the past 22 years from the dream of providing a summer camp experience for inner-city youth into a year-round youth development organization. Educational opportunities are created to promote critical thinking and support decision-making skills. Throughout the fall, winter and spring, young people participate in school meetings with an intensive educational focus and structured curriculum. 4th through 7th graders in our Undergrad Program and 8th through 12th grade students in our Post Grad Program benefit from a curriculum that guides young people through developing and accomplishing their short- and long-term goals. Summers at Morry's Camp intensify the learning experiences.

In addition to serving nearly 400 young people each year, we share our lives with 78 wonderful, marvelous, remarkable graduates of the nine-year Project Morry program. Our alumni return to visit us, work for us, participate as volunteers, share their perspectives and serve as role models to our younger boys and girls. Alumni make an impact on all of us with their enthusiasm for new-found independence, challenges, resiliency, choices, decisions and hopes.

We are proud to report that 98% of our young people graduate high school, 85% attend college, and others work full-time or join the military. Our circle always comes around again to Morry Stein, the inspiration behind Project Morry. His vision fulfilled completes our circle. A young person explains, "Our group has the power to achieve anything, if we all work together."

We offer our heartfelt gratitude to all who take part in our outstanding Project Morry community including campers, alumni, parents, families, Board of Directors, volunteers, staff, mentors and contributors. Thank you all for your support, encouragement and dreaming the dream with us.

We are thrilled to celebrate the efforts of everyone who has embraced Morry's dream and made it their own. We are continually amazed by the supporters and champions of Project Morry...and many of them never met Morry.

A very special thank you to our extraordinary Board of Directors, volunteers, associates and friends, as well as our caring staff, steadfast contributors and loyal supporters. We are fortunate to have so many dedicated friends. Our children look forward to a brighter future...because of your belief and support.



To accomplish this, we make a **nine-year**, **year-round commitment to our kids**, supporting, encouraging and teaching them. With an intensive annual summer camp experience and comprehensive school-year support from age nine until they graduate from high school, youth are guided through the most critical stages of their academic and social development.

The youth who participate in our programs are from urban neighborhoods in New York and Connecticut. Youth are selected based on leadership qualities, ability to work within a group, potential to enhance their personal and academic lives, desire to attend camp, and financial need. FOCUS & FUNDAMENTALS











FALL BENEFIT UPDATE

2016 AND 2017 ANNUAL FALL BENEFITS

For two consecutive years, Project Morry has experienced tremendous growth in attendance and revenue for its signature fundraiser honoring key volunteers and supporters who have made a significant impact in our work with youth. The 2016 and 2017 events were both held at Pier Sixty Chelsea Piers in New York City.

Scott Ralls received the 2016 Morry Award, our highest honor, for his exemplary contribution to Project Morry for over two decades. As a camp director and owner, Scott knows first-hand the tremendous impact our nine-year program has on changing the trajectory of our kids. The event was attended by over 500 guests.

The 2017 fall event proved to be our largest revenue generating event to date, raising over \$1m with nearly 600 guests in attendance. Project Morry presented Douglas Present with the Morry Award. Youth are matched with volunteer coaches who provide year-round support, on a monthly basis, particularly with college and career preparation.


